INSHORE AT APALACHICOLA OCTOBER 2017 by John Shipp



I went fishing with a couple of friends on a 24 ft. Pathfinder for 3 days starting Monday Oct 30, 2017. We fished out of Bay City and worked shell bars.

I was looking forward to learning how to fish the Bay and got some good lessons. We fished shell piles and hard bottom as opposed to the grass flats and rocks I am used to further south. Fish bit all baits with cut bait predominant on Sand Trout and small curly tailed grubs (white with green tails like Robert had with me on the previous trip). I had them in Gulp juice and they were so effective on Specs that one of my fishing buddies switched to them the last two days.

Each morning we went directly to a spot about 300 yards west of the St. Georges Island Bridge (\$2 bridge) halfway out the north end, perpendicular to the highest hump on that section (not the intercoastal hump). There were several guide boats there each morning and all boats caught a lot of fish. First day I caught only one with the other guys pulling in 20+. I had the wrong tackle. You need 20-30 lb braid with a 2 oz or heavier sinker and a jig head on a 20 lb leader tipped with shrimp or cut bait. Cut bait was small, about 1 inch square. You throw onto the shell pile and have to be able to feel the sinker "rolling over the oyster shells". If you cannot feel the shells you are in the wrong place. We were anchored and fished pulling the bait against the tide. Trick is to be on the bottom, over shells, with a tight line back to the meat tipped jig. You have to set the hook like a bass. I got used to the tactic by the second and third day and began to catch fish like everyone else.

People were also fishing west of the power line to the east of the bridge. They mixed in with the oyster boats. We went to a spot on the north side of the 98 bridge but did not fish after several other boats who were there reported no bites. We drifted under the 98 bridge pilings and caught the largest flounder I have ever seen on one of the white and green grubs under a cork.

Other Fish

The Apalachicola River breaks into about 4 "rivers" and numerous creeks as it passes through the delta and dumps into the bay. We went up the Apalachicola River and cut through to the Little St Marks via a creek just below Bay City. We moved down the river to fish the hard bottoms and ledges where these estuaries dumped into the bay. We anchored at points in the river and threw jigs into the deep holes that had hard bottoms and bumped the jigs up the sides. We caught enough trout to stay busy and several undersized redfish. We also caught two black drums. Fishing was steady as we moved if we did not catch anything within 15 minutes. My friends already knew where the holes were. The tide was always moving swiftly and fish tended to bite in groups. This was similar to winter fishing I had done in smaller creeks and smaller rivers but with much more water flow and the fish were not concentrated. We were always miles from solid ground, fishing in the marsh areas in the river delta. We did some drifting but tended to be anchored with the pole when we caught fish. It appeared that schools of fish were moving with the tide. The trolling motor was broken or we would have used it to work the sides. The redfish were caught on the edges and trout on the sides of the troughs.

We also went out into the bay and fished several spots that were hard bottom oyster shell piles. We only caught one keeper trout doing this, but it was the biggest of the trip. This was a great trip and taught me a lot of techniques and locations for fishing the bay. It was definitely much different from what I had done in the past.
