Back-to-Back Orange Beach Tournaments: Double the Fun and Less Expense

When fuel costs made it too expensive for members to tow boats to the Keys this year, the idea came up of adding a June Orange Beach tournament (in addition to the previously scheduled July tournament). A local storage facility offered a very inexpensive rate to store boats between the two tournaments, which meant members could tow boats down for the June tournament and leave them in Orange Beach until the July tournament. This cut down on expenses, as well as the other hassles associated with towing. Lots of fish were caught and members had a great time, too.

from the starting gate, several of our boats had mechanical problems. After industrious efforts by the captains & crews, everyone managed to get back on the water and catch fish. (When you own a boat, it pays to develop skills with duct tape, wire, and rubber bands).



Mother Nature was cooperative, as seas were 2 ft or less for both tournaments. Despite the fact that bluewater was out of reach for most of the participants, there were still some great catches, including a monster 20-lb. triple-tail, caught by Matt Brown aboard the Outlaw during a pre-fish day at the first tournament.

Tournament #1 took place June 19 - 21st (fishing days 6/20 and 6/21). The Captains Meeting was held at the Cotton Bayou Condominiums, as were the Weigh-Ins. Top Gun Tackle updated us on fishing conditions. Right

Tournament #2 took place July 17-19 (fishing days 7/18 and 7/19). As with the June tournament, weigh-ins and the Captains Meeting were held at Cotton Bayou. Local resident and ASWSC member Kenny Vines of KV Yachts gave us the scoop on fishing conditions.

Bottom fishing was hindered by a serious current (some boats were using up to 2 pounds of lead in order to reach bottom). Water clarity was improving and, overall, conditions were very good.



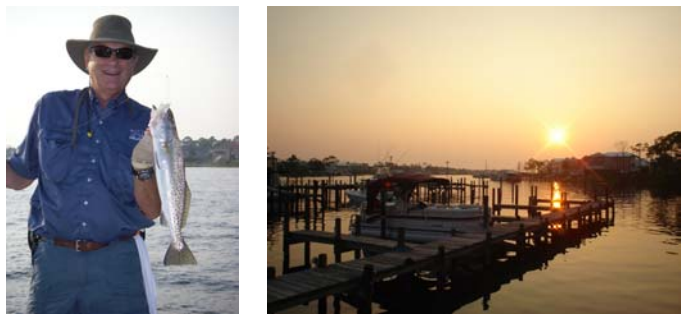
Outlaw ran away with both day's weigh-in totals, putting over 1400 total points on the board. On Day One, the race for second was very close between Truffle Shuffle and Bad Buoys. Lil Ti, Fish Tales, Fish Tales Too, and Last Bastian weren't far behind. Fish Tales and Lil Ti threw the dice and made long runs requiring some wee-hours navigation. Richard Watkins (Lil Ti) managed to find some tuna and brought back the tournament's big fish, a 35 lb yellowfin, and gathered enough points to finish in second place. Jack Blackwell (Fish Tales) had a

bit of tough luck, losing some tuna to cutoffs - or maybe those guys got confused and thought they were on a luxury cruise (easy to do on that 31' Luhrs - nice boat, Jack!)



Most importantly, everyone made it back safe and sound - and we all had a good time. When the smoke cleared, only 45 points separated 2nd Place (Lil Ti) and 4th Place (Bad Buoys), with 3rd Place Truffle Shuffle sandwiched neatly in-between. Talk about a close finish.

The Awards Dinner for the July tournament was held at the Bayside Grill (at Sportsman's Marina) - spectacular evening view of the area and great food. Skip James won the \$100 Wingman Big Fish award with a seatrout he caught on a Wingman lure. Kendall Spencer won the \$50 Robert Lynn Junior Angler Award with a 2-lb. seatrout (his brother Jonathan almost edged him out with an amberjack, but was just shy of the 28" minimum length).

Orange Beach is the Place for Me!

OB2 (Orange Beach Tournament #2) by Lenny Pisarski

The turnaround tournament here was another success story in the Club's long list of adventures. Our boats had a couple of days of great weather and took advantage of the calm seas. I fished with new member Jack Blackwell - his first outing with the Club - along with Frank Nicoletti, Jack's son-in-law, Joe Watkins, and friend Buddy Hall. Jack's 31' Luhrs is well equipped and great for fishing. As most of us already knew the water was "green" a long way out, caused by the rain in the mid west coming out of the Mississippi. Trolling for pelagics was out with these water conditions, but the bottom fishing was not affected.



The tournament got kicked off pool side at Cotton Bayou. Dan Bohlayer and Scott Rowe cooked up burgers and brats. Our sponsors provided about \$500 in store gift certificates for our raffle. Our speaker, Kenny Vines, gave us the bad news about the dirty water, but told us the bottom fishing should be great. With that promise in mind, most everyone was at the docks at first light. The Cotton Bayou is a great venue for us with almost all members staying there and great dockage.

As we headed for the pass, we stopped by the Baitman and picked up some Cigar minnows. Jim Mason's crew had shared some of their pinfish with us, so we had all the bait we needed. We ran SSE to a few numbers in the 50 foot depth with nothing on the bottom so we moved on. Buddy Hall was running the boat and on the way out picked up something on the bottom in 115 feet, it turned out to be our honey hole. We commenced to load up on Snapper, Red, Gray and Vermillion along with triggerfish and rainbow runners. Jack put out a floater King rig and within minutes he had a hook up. After a little coaxing he brought in a respectful 25.7 pound King (which also puts him in the #1 spot for the Mackerel category of the Angler of the Year program). We ran around to other sites, but none were better than that location. So ended our first day with "stink in the box" At the weigh-in, most boats had limit catches of Red Snapper along with many Kings and AJ's.

That night at dinner we decided to go deep in the morning, with an early start. We left the dock at about 3:30 a.m. and met the baitman just as he arrived on site. We set a course for the Beer Cans and settled in for a long 80 mile ride. We arrived just as a rain storm did and we trolled around the platform along with 4 other boats. Jack's bridge has enough room so we could all get out of the rain. With nothing doing there we headed for the Ram Powell about 18 miles west. We arrived and had 3 other boats all jigging for Yellowfin Tuna. We trolled around for a bit and it wasn't long before a school chasing a bait ball hit the surfaced. We plotted our course in front of them and in short order had a hook-up on the port rod. Love that sound of line singing out.... Jack picked up the rod and was fighting the fish when Bam!!! It got off.... This happened a second with Frank on the rod, another lost fish..... we tried again and again but couldn't get a hook up. When we brought in the lines 2 of them had been cut off ahead of the double line and we never saw them hit.... The schools were loaded with mostly 20 to 40 pound Yellow Fin Tuna. They were flying all over the baitfish. The other boats also didn't hook up. So much for our sushi run. That's the way our day 2 went. We tried other platforms but couldn't come up with much of anything. On the way in we stopped at the Unical cut-off platform and bottom fished. We caught a few Red Snapper and we called it a day as we still had a 64 mile run. We made it back just as the weigh-in finished, a long 15 hour day on the water.



The Awards dinner was held at Sportsman Marina's Bay-side Grill. Dan made the award presentation for 5th through 1st place. We came in 6th - Oh well!!! I presented the Bob Lynn Junior Angler award to Kendall Spencer for his 2 pound Sea Trout. Nice going!!!! The big fish award went to Richard Watkins for his 35 pound Yellow Fin Tuna. Our sponsor, Wingman, provided a \$100 award for the largest fish caught with the Wingman, which went to Skip James for his Sea Trout. That's about it for Orange Beach this season. Two visits and both successful tournaments. Lord willing we will be back again. Thanks go out to Lynda at Cotton Bayou for helping with the fine accommodations. And my thanks to Jack Blackwell, a new member I hope will be fishing with the Club again and again....

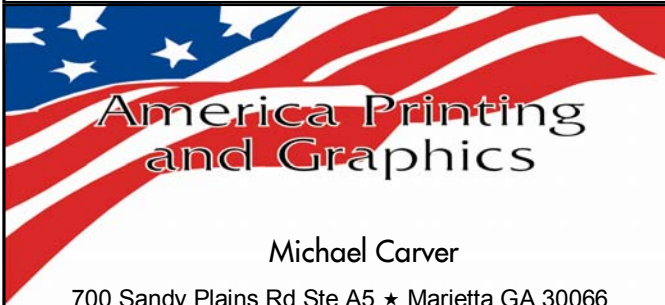

Ocean Bill Goes Too Far

Congress is considering legislation which would result in new and potentially harmful fishing regulations. H.R. 21, also known as Oceans 21, would set new requirements on fishermen and fisheries managers outside of and on top of the established process under the nation's primary fisheries law, the Magnuson-Stevens Act. This legislation would establish a comprehensive National Oceans Policy and guiding principles for use and management of U.S. coasts, oceans, Great Lakes and their resources. While the intention of this legislation is to improve coordination among federal agencies, laws and regulations, H.R. 21 would only result in additional layers of bureaucracy within the management of federal marine fisheries.

For more than 30 years, federally managed species have been regulated through the Magnuson-Stevens Act. As currently written, H.R. 21 would create a separate and likely conflicting bureaucratic regime under which fisheries would have to be regulated.

Please contact your member of Congress and request that H.R. 21 be amended to ensure that the science-based, stakeholder-driven process of the Magnuson-Stevens Act - not Oceans 21 - remains the exclusive authority to manage federal marine fisheries.


