Orange Beach Blast and Airshow July 2018



The first Orange Beach tournament of the year was July 11th to 13th. Nice weather brought 5 boats to the Gulf. By the end of the competition, Mike Springer and the crew of *Outlaw* had pulled in enough for the win.

Thanks to Cefus for the great shots of the boats in the tournament and at the airshow. *Outlaw* (middle of the lineup) managed to put together a nice catch of Almaco Jacks, Kings, and Tile Fish to rack up a first day score of 605. One of the Tile Fish was determined to be a new club record caught by Dylan Brown. The crew had three Almaco jacks over 24 pounds (caught by Mike Springer, Jim Tatum and Pat Brown) and thought Pat's was a record at 27 pounds. But, it turns out the club record had been broken just a few weeks earlier in Savannah with a 28 pound fish.

Day two was not as productive for the *Outlaw* crew, but they still brought in a couple of Scamps, 3 Red Snapper over 10 lbs, and a King. The 295 points total wasn't as impressive as Day 1, but it was enough to clinch the win.

Second place was won by *Pegasus*. Capt Chuck Alford, (2019 Club President and 2018 Boat of the Year) had a slow first day with Almaco Jack and a nice Mangrove at 9.2 pounds. Their second day was more productive with 260 points worth of big Red Snapper. It was enough to take home the 2nd place plaque.

Captain George Burkhart aboard the *Reel Serious* was the winner of the third place plaque with catches of Scamp Grouper and Vermillion on the first day, and some nice Red Snapper on the second day.

Rick Kolman and the crew on *Playing Hookie* decided to try an overnight trip the first night. It has often been a winning strategy at many club tournaments; sadly, it didn't work this time. The second day they did pick up a Snapper and Laura Lazar used a handful of Beeliners to add to her run for Lady Angler of the Year. Which is a good example for everyone: in those competitions, enter every fish; it all adds up.

Cefus McRae, *Wide Open Two*, took Fourth Place and is the source of great pictures for the article.



He and Bill Hawk picked up a nice catch of Kings, Dolphin and a Mangrove, but all were smaller fish and didn't get them into the running for a win.

What may have been the highlight of the week came on Saturday after the tournament. In what has become an annual tradition for the ASWSC, members rafted up for the fantastic Blue Angels air show. Club boats with two additions headed to Pensacola Bay to watch the show. The Navy and Marine Corps pilots are based at Pensacola and fly the FA-18 Hornets in an incredible show. By the way, the Navy signed a contract in August to convert 9 FA-18E Super Hornets for use by the Blue Angels. It will be 2021 before they are delivered.

The show always caps off a great week for the club; the Orange Beach area is one of the most consistent locations for a club tournament. We have been holding tournaments there since at least September of 1991. And the Cotton Bayou Condos, with their docks, cleaning station and on-site accommodations have proven to be a favorite with club members. And just for planning purposes, next year's air show is set for Saturday July 13. On the next page are a few more of Cefus' pics from the July O.B. Tourny.

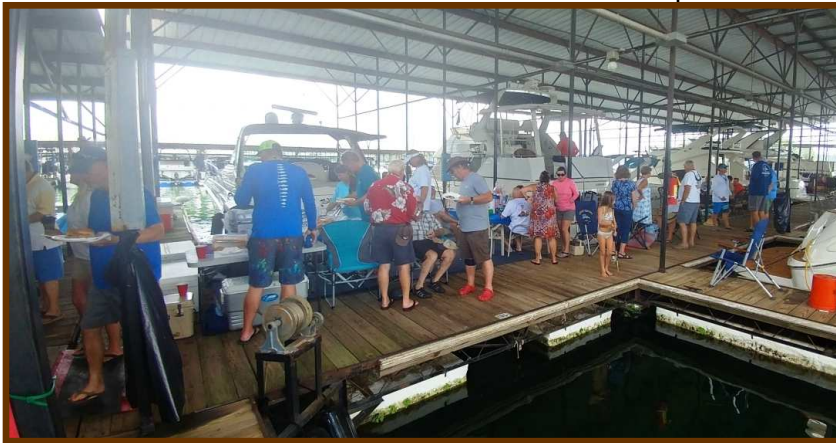

Panama City Beach Rumble

The Rumble on the Redneck Riviera held at Panama City Beach August 16th - 18th was a fun and eventful tournament. If it wasn't the first tournament ASWSC has held in PCB, it has been many years since one was held there. Eight boats entered the tournament and were vying for the coveted cast iron frying pan trophies, another creative contribution by John Roché. The tournament was based at Treasure Island Marina. Five boats stayed at the Marina, while Butch Bowen (*Just Like Cheating*) and John Embleton (*Silver King*) fished out of Mexico Beach where they are based; they drove their catches over by land to the weigh-in. Chuck Alford (*Pegasus*) kept his boat at his condo which is line-of-sight to Treasure Island Marina.



At the Captains' meeting all the Captains were given nice goody buckets by a rep from Half Hitch Tackle, which also extended 10% discounts to club members. Afterwards, most of the club had a nice social event with dinner together at Uncle Ernie's restaurant, many going by boat; it was very nice.

The weather was OK, some rain storms had to be dodged on day 1 and the seas were a little sloppy in the mornings, but overall not too bad and they calmed down both days.

Day 1 was very eventful with all the boats catching fish. The crew of *Pegasus* got the shock of a lifetime when the "shark" they battled for an hour turned out to be a 111.2 pound Amberjack. But at the weigh in, *Persevere* stole their thunder with a sailfish release along with Scamp and Tilefish to take the lead on Day 1.

On Day 2 there were a lot of fish caught again, with the most notable being a very nice 17.1 pound Dolphin on *Loophole*. *Pegasus* managed a nice 43 pound AJ and Vermilion Snapper while *Persevere* was on the sail-fish hunt but didn't score another sail, allowing *Pegasus* to come in first place with *Persevere* taking second.



Silver King took third with a very impressive assortment of fish: King and Spanish Mackerel, Dolphin, Flounder, Vermillion and Mangrove Snapper and Triggerfish. There was a nice variety of fish caught by the boats, loads of Vermillion Snapper, Mangrove Snapper, Scamp, Almaco Jacks, Greater and Lesser Amberjack, Porgies, Tilefish, King and Spanish Mackerel, Strawberry Grouper, Wenchman, Flounder, Triggerfish, Dolphin and the Sailfish.



Concurrent with the tournament was a Mini-Rod contest, with everyone entered using a kid's rod. The rules allowed changing the line; most folks changed to braid, but they had to use the provided rod and reel. The rods weren't too bad but the reels were only appropriate for maybe catching small freshwater bream, which made the contest challenging and fun.

Saturday night the Awards Banquet was held at Pier 77 restaurant and everyone had a good time; the food was good and we even had live entertainment for a little while.

The “Banana” List:

1. *Loophole* ran aground on day 1, the boat survived but one of the crew Tony Vazquez jumped out to push and hurt his leg and was out for the rest of the tournament.
2. *Outlaw* had something go wrong in a motor and blew out a 6” hole in his lower unit on Day 2 and had to limp in.
3. *Persevere* almost made it, but about a mile from home the truck transmission went out

All the feedback seemed to be positive about the PCB tournament; the marina staff was accommodating, especially with the 24-hour fuel & ice availability, and the fishing was pretty good. PCB will likely continue to be on the schedule for the coming years.

Grand Isle – Inshore

Inshore Chartered Fishing Trip to Grand Isle LA – Sep. 19/20, 2018

Ken Clonts and I drove to Grand Isle for two days of guided inshore fishing. Our objective was to explore the area and get some idea of how to fish Louisiana. This was my first trip to LA and Ken's first trip to Grand Isle. We stayed at Bridge Side Marina on the island. It took 10 hrs to get there and 11.5 to return (traffic issues). This is the location that the ASWSC uses as a HQ for their tournaments in Grand Isle. It was my objective to check the Isle out. It was hot for September but the weather was otherwise great. This was the off-season and weekdays were slow. Few people were on the island.

Fishing weather could not have been better except for the heat. It was hot and we noticed all charters were in by 1pm due to heat. Water was calm with light breezes.

Wed Sept 19 (Capt. Darren Anselmi)

We left the marina dock at 6:45 after a few issues with licenses. You have to have a special 3-day license to use a guide and the marina didn't have anyone who knew how to work the license machine. Lesson one: get licenses on-line before you arrive. LA is the only state I fish where you need an out of state charter fishing license to fish with a guide (\$12 on line).

Darren had a 24-ft Blazer Bay with a Yamaha 300, a state-of-the-art Minn Kota trolling motor, and two anchor poles. The boat was great. You need to move fast here because of the distances.

We were fishing with live shrimp under popping corks. We drove about 15 miles NE (back away from the coast) and fished around rock islands (manmade), grassy islands, and abandoned gas and oil well structures. I had never been in the area, and to see at least 30 abandoned oil/gas wells at any given time was strange to me. Lots of navigation obstructions (manmade) with the abandoned wells, pipelines, and commercial oyster roosts make local knowledge of the area a must.

We boated 13 legal trout and two legal reds before Ken got to feeling bad due to overheating and we had to go in very early. We caught fish pretty steady. I tried to go back out locally with the guide and caught one red near the marina before a rain squall caused us to call it early. All in all, it was good day fishing. We fished flowing water washing around island points as the tide changed. Fish appeared to be waiting in the eddy currents to strike the bait floating by. This was much the same fishing technique as I would use in the Apalachicola Delta.

Thurs Sept 20 (Capt. Dwayne Price, Dream Catcher Guide Service)

We left the dock at first light with Capt. Dwayne Price and headed NW. Capt. Price had a 25-ft Sportsman with a 300 hp Yamaha outfitted with anything you needed. I particularly liked his Simrad machine. We had told him the night before that we wanted to catch Redfish and were not interested in trout. We drove for 45 min at 42 mph to get to his honey hole.

The first stop produced about 6 reds including a 30-incher. I caught the first fish on my first cast. The 30-inch fish on light tackle was a lot of fun to catch. We fished 4 other stops in a mile radius, with all but one being productive. We saw fish moving at all spots and fished with mud minnows under popping corks. You tried to put the bait just in front of a spot where you saw them feeding. The spots had moving water or the wind pushing water against a grass line. Tides were fairly high. We needed to return to the dock by noon (to drive back to Ga) and we had 13 reds when we quit fishing at 11:30. It was getting hot. We had a breeze all morning. We returned to the Marina at 52 mph in 30 minutes. Simply speaking, we fished a long way from the Marina up north. Looking on the map, we were close to Golden Meadow.

Our Captain was the best bait caster I have ever seen. Several times he took our pole, threw the bait to a specific spot (his casts were at least 40 feet longer than mine) and secured a hit almost immediately. He was a very good guide; I would highly recommend him. He put us on fish at every stop. He showed us where to throw the bait.

Conclusion:

- Get licenses ahead of time.
- Will try mud minnows again.
- Fish are more plentiful and larger in LA.
- The distances involved would make it hard to fish with my small boat. It is advisable to hire a guide with a bay boat and a big motor. Speed to cover the distances are a necessity.
- The motel was fish camp quality. The marina had everything you needed except licenses. There are lots of places to rent on the island. I would suggest a group rent a house, lots available. Restaurants were closed due to the offseason, but we found a good one about 8 miles back.

One of the final tournaments of the year was a return to the familiar confines of Cotton Bayou and the waters off Orange Beach. Historically the months of September and October have been prime White Marlin time off Orange Beach. But that depends on how close the blue water is in and if the Gulf Loop Current is having any effect. Short of marlin, there is still plenty to catch. Red Snapper season was closed for this trip, but Grouper and Amberjack were available. Not to mention all the offshore fun fish Tuna, Dolphin and Wahoo.



Top boat in the tournament was Captain Chuck Alford and the crew on *Pegasus* on the way to their Boat of the Year trophy. They had several nice catches. Laura Lazar snagged a very nice Yellow Fin Tuna at 69.2 lbs and Leslie Alford landed a 19.5 lb Wahoo.



Jace Spencer and the guys on *Bad Buoys* pulled second place in the tournament including a very nice almost 18-lb Blackfin caught by Richard Holden.



George Burkhart and the *Reel Serious* team grabbed third place with a catch including a nice 18-lb amberjack.

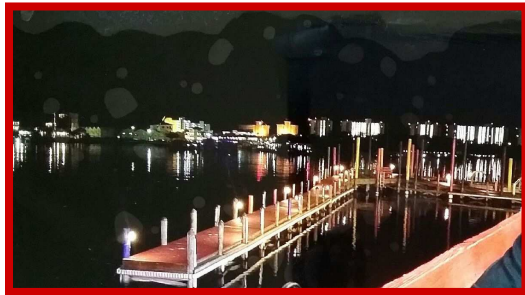

The tournament was capped off with an awards banquet and some fine seafood at Flippers Restaurant on Bear Point.

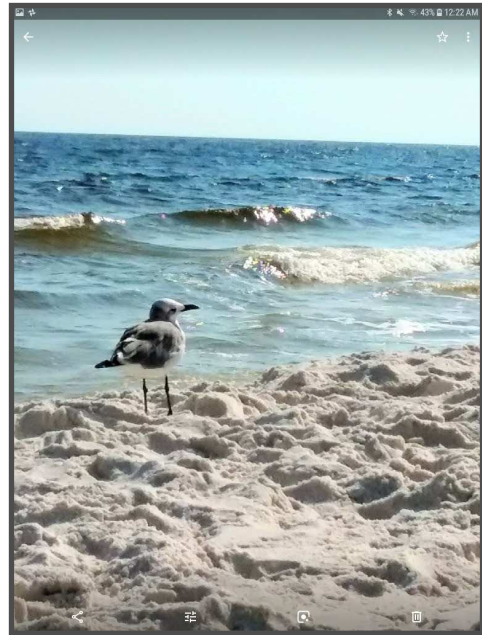

Since joining ASWSC in 2009 my wife, Paula, has heard many fishing stories, several about Apalachicola. About a year ago she expressed an interest in traveling there, just to see the area and the famous "Bay City Lodge". So we made it happen this past November and I could not plan the trip without asking her if she wanted to go inshore fishing; her reply was yes, to my surprise.

Obviously the timing followed Hurricane Michael, therefore it required a little flexibility to get everything arranged. We booked with local guide Mike Shiver, who came recommended by a friend. Mike told us up front that speckled trout and redfish had been off since the hurricane, although better in the last two weeks. I'd wanted to investigate the flounder bite ever since a waitress at Papa Joes told us she was going gigging after work one night and was hoping to bring home 200 pounds of flounder.

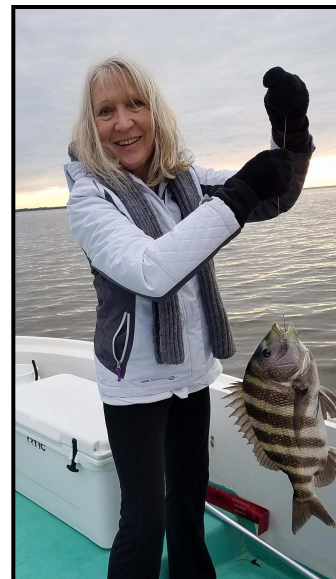
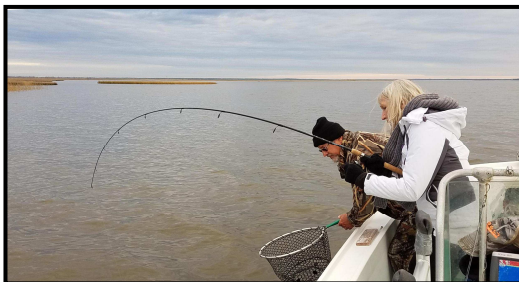
The day turned out great, 61 degrees at 7:00 AM and very little wind throughout the day. Our first stop was at the mouth of the St Marks River where we caught a 6 pound sheepshead and lost what seemed like another. A few stops in the river with no luck and we boated toward the north end of St George Island in search of a relatively deep hole. Mike's understanding was that bombing practice in WW11 created this hole. It ranged about 100 feet in diameter with a maximum depth around 32 feet. We found it with fish showing on the bottom.

Keep in mind that Paula has not fished in about 20 years, although as a youngster she caught a nice King Mackerel in Gulf Shores. She was happy with the temps and calm seas in the bay and so far was enjoying it, but if the fishing turned out to be slow she would be ready to call it a day before noon. I wanted to make the most of this opportunity with a guide.

As soon as we anchored over the hole and put out lines, baited with shrimp, the bite began. We fished one spot until 12:00 and headed back to shore with 61 fish in the cooler. Most were White Trout, some over 15 inches and some were what the locals call Whiting or Southern Mackerel. A few of these reached 15 inches as well - not bad according to Mike. A good day, even with no flounder.

Mike was on the phone with a couple of other guides who were out that day and the fishing was slow for them; maybe it won't be too long until the bay recovers and fishing improves overall.

Most importantly, Paula had a great time, even relishing the catch of a sea snake (really an eel) and it did not hurt that she was able to enjoy the catching from a seated position with someone else taking the fish off and baiting her hook. Now she says she wants to go fishing with me more often.

Mustang Survival self-inflating life jacket donated by Bay Marine, went to Jace Spencer through the silent auction.

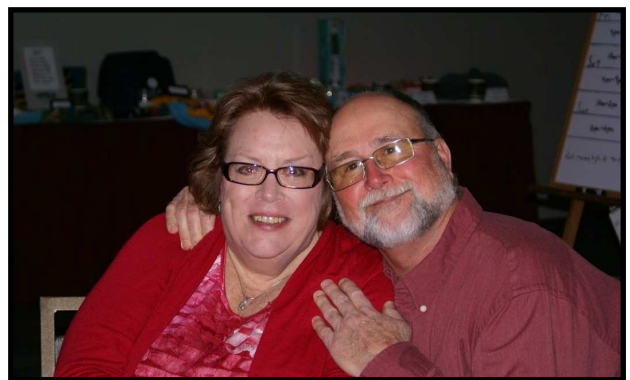

Here it is the middle of winter, the slow season in the boating industry, and Bay Marine is anything but slow. The store is bustling, with construction, painting and assembling shelving. The boat show is less than a week way and Bay Marine already has 16 boats at the World Congress Center waiting for the show to start.

Bay Marine was started 47 years ago by brothers Jim and Bob Bay. Who knew back then that locating on Hwy 41 between Barrett Parkway and Chastain Road would give them the amount of exposure that they get today. Having this great location is a reason why they sell 100-plus boats per year. Although they are very close to Lake Allatoona, 35% of those boats are salt water boats.

Bay Marine sells Manitou, Pathfinder, Cobia, Hewes, Vexus and Phoenix. Greg told me they may not be the cheapest boats, but they have the best value. Greg said that it's important to stand behind your product and to put your customer into the correct boat. Today's purchasers want all the creature comforts, thick padded seats, stereo systems, heads, etc. Parting words from Angi is that boats need to be run. They don't do well when they sit for long periods of time. Keep them maintained and be safe on the water.
